University to Offer Fall Course in Social Justice

CANYON, Texas—Grassroots activism to raise awareness and create solutions will be the focus of a new and timely course offering in "Social Justice: Change the World" beginning this fall at West Texas A&M University.

Dr. Lisa Garza, associate professor of sociology, will teach the special topics course, Soc. 3392.01, from 3-4:15 p.m. each Monday and Wednesday during the fall 2015 semester. It's a course based on social movements, and Garza will introduce case studies from the 1950s through the 1970s. Topics will range from the civil rights movement to the anti-war movement. Students also will explore current events and issues while learning about solutions and mobilization.

"Social movements are so important to study, both past and current," Garza said. "These movements bring bout necessary change and bring greater equality in a rapidly changing world."
